check through (idiomatic) To permit someone to continue onward, e.g. through a security checkpoint, after verifying their identity, tickets, etc.

We checked through the photographs to make sure there were none missing.

fall through (intransitive, idiomatic) To be unsuccessful, abort, come to nothing/naught; to be cancelled; not to proceed.

Their plans to go hiking Saturday **fell through** because it rained.

get through (transitive, idiomatic) To succeed in communicating with (after تحايل initial difficulty).

I explained it carefully, but I just couldn't get through to him.

go through (literally) To travel from one end of something to the other. To examine or scrutinize

The train **went through** the tunnel.

Every morning, she went through her mail over a cup of coffee.

look through To gaze through a gap or aperture To search, either with the eyes or by hand ننظر من خلال

He **looked through** the binoculars at the bird.

Airport security looked through her purse and confiscated her nail scissors.

pull through to come through pain and trouble through perseverance

At one stage it looked as if she was going to die, but she pulled through in the end.

put through (idiomatic) To connect (a telephone caller with intended callee).

(idiomatic) to cause to endure

Please hold the line a moment while I put you through to the sales office.

After all the grief my wife has put me through, I wonder why I'm still with her. run through (transitive, idiomatic) To summarise briefly فحص بسرعة Let me **run through** today's meeting for those who missed it.

see through (transitive) To find something to be visually transparent. الرك حقيقة الأمر

Their fabric is so thin that I can **see through** these curtains.

We **saw through** the water with ease; it was as clear as glass.

sleep through Not wake up. نام طول اليل بالرغم من صعوبة الموقف

I **slept through** the storm even though the wind blew some slates off the roof.

think through

To fully consider an action, and understand all its consequences. تمعن الأمر

The plan fell through because they hadn't **thought** it **through** properly.

account for To explain.

They had to **account for** all the money that had gone missing.

ask for To provoke a negative reaction. Request to have or be aiven.

You're **asking for** trouble.

I asked for the menu.

call for Demand.

Go to collect something.

Telephone for something.

Go and collect someone to take them out.

Require.

The Opposition party called for the minister's resignation after the scandal broke.

The courier **called for** your parcel, but I told him it wasn't ready yet.

I'll call for a cab right away.

I'll call for you at seven, so be ready because the film starts at half past.

An emergency like this **calls for** some pretty drastic action.

care for Like.

I don't care for fizzy drinks; I prefer water

fall for Be attracted to somebody, fall in love.
