

phrasal verbs with out

Verb and meaning	Example(s)
<p>branch out to expand in the manner of branches وسع نشاطاته</p> <p>(idiomatic) to attempt something new or different, but related</p>	<p>The chart starts in the center and branches out from there.</p> <p>Studying Latin may make it easier to branch out into Spanish or Italian.</p>
<p>break out (intransitive) To escape, especially forcefully or defiantly. انطلق</p>	<p>They broke out of prison in the middle of the night.</p>
<p>carry out (transitive) To hold while moving something out. (transitive, idiomatic) To fulfill. ينفذ</p>	<p>We'll have to carry the piano out of the shop.</p> <p>She finally carried out her lifelong ambition when she appeared in a Hollywood blockbuster.</p>

check out (intransitive) To confirm and pay for goods and services at a facility (e.g.: supermarket, online store, hotel) when leaving.

الدفع

Be sure to **check out** of the hotel before noon.

I'm done shopping, so I'll go **check out** now.

come out To be discovered, be revealed. To be published, be issued. يخرج

It **came out** that he had been lying all the time.

My new book **comes out** next week.

cross out (idiomatic) To strike out; to draw a line through. شطب

If you make a mistake, just **cross it out**.

cry out To shout in a loud voice, due to pain, or fear, or unhappiness. تصرخ

Do you **cry out** in your sleep?

drop out (idiomatic) Prematurely and voluntarily leave (school, a race, or the like). ترك الدراسة

Nothing went well in high school, so he **dropped out**.

eat out (intransitive) To dine at a restaurant or such public place.

تناول الطعام خارج

To celebrate their anniversary, the couple **ate out** by the bay.

Jacky wanted Korean barbecue, but his mom didn't want to **eat out**.

find out to get some information about sth/sb

اكتشف

I haven't **found out** anything about him yet.

Can you **find out** what time the meeting starts?

We **found out** later that we had been at the same school.

get out To leave or escape

اخرج

In case of fire, **get out** by the nearest exit.

Never take life seriously. Nobody **gets out** alive anyways.

give out (transitive) To issue; to distribute.

فرق

Can you help me to **give out** the new books to the class, please?

hand out (transitive) to distribute

وزع

Could you **hand** these books **out**, please?

She **handed out** medals and certificates to the winners.

<p>keep out (intransitive) To refrain from entering a place or condition.</p> <p>ابعاد</p>	<p>After being warned, he kept out. The warning kept him out.</p>
<p>lay out - to arrange in a certain way</p> <p>وضع</p>	<p>Because his opinions are all over the place, they find it easy to scrutinise them and lay them out.</p>
<p>leave out - To omit, to not include, to neglect to mention</p> <p>أسقط</p>	<p>The journalist decided to leave out certain details from her story. The journalist decided to leave the sleaze out of her story.</p>
<p>let out -To release.</p>	<p>The students were let out of school early.</p>
<p>lock out – to make a building safe by locking the doors and windows</p> <p>حرم شخصا من الدخول</p>	<p>Don't forget to lock up at night. He locked up the shop and went home.</p>

look out (intransitive) To look from within to the outside.

انتبه

Look out, and you will see the rain has stopped.

make out (transitive) To draw up (a document etc.),

Cheques may be **made out** to the Foo Bar Company.

measure out – to measure sb/sth

We spent the morning **measuring up** and deciding where the furniture would go.

pass out (intransitive)
To faint; to become unconscious

اغشى عليه

I **pass out** at the sight of blood.

I **passed out** on the train after drinking a bottle of vodka.

pick out – to choose sth/sb carefully from a group of people or things

اختار

She was **picked out** from dozens of applications for the job.

He **picked out** the ripest peach for me.

point out (transitive, idiomatic) To identify among a group of similar subjects, or in a scene where the subject might not be readily seen or noticed, with a gesture of the body. **لفت الانتباه لـ**

He **pointed out** the little brown bird in the tree.
She **pointed out** the two drummers in the class.

pull out (idiomatic) To withdraw; especially of military forces; to retreat. **انسحب**

He **pulled out** his gun before she had a chance to scream.

put out – to stop sth from burning or shining – to put out a candle/cigarette/light **أخمد**

Firefighters soon **put the fire out**.

rub out (transitive) To delete or erase or remove (أزال something) by rubbing. **محا**

The teacher wanted to **rub out** the chalk marks on the blackboard.

rule out -To reject an option from a list of possibilities **استبعد**

As John Doe had an alibi, the police were able to **rule him out** as a suspect.

set out (transitive) To explain something, or give exact details, usually in writing.

عرض

This contract **sets out** all the terms of the agreement as we discussed.

share out
(transitive) To share evenly. قسم , شاطر

We **shared out** the pizza between the four of us.
Rita **shared** the pizza **out** between the four of us.

slip out to leave quietly, and unnoticed. خرج خلسة

I was talking to Jim, about Paul and Ethel, when it just **slipped out** about their possible divorce. I'm sorry.

sort out (transitive) To clarify by reviewing mentally. شرح
(transitive) To fix, as a problem.
(transitive) To arrange.

It's a bit confused at the moment, I'll try to **sort it out** later.
Could you call Dave and sort out a meeting for tomorrow?

stick out To protrude; to extend beyond. برز

I can fit the pipe in my car, but one end will stick out the back. He **stuck out** his tongue at me.

storm out – to enter or leave a place in a way that shows that you are angry

اقتحم

He **stormed out** of the house, slamming the door as he went.

take out To remove.

أخرج

Please **take out** the trash before the whole house starts to smell

think out – to consider or plan sth carefully

فكر , درس

It's a very well **thought out** plan.

throw out To discard; to dispense with something; to throw away

طرد

Just **throw out** that pen if it doesn't write anymore. They decided to **throw out** the idea because it would have been too expensive.

try out (transitive) To test something in order to see if it works.(intransitive) To undergo a test before being selected; to audition.

جرب أو حاول

If you want to play varsity, you'll have to **try out** for the team.

We're **trying out** for the parts of Romeo and Juliet.

turn out (intransitive, idiomatic)

To result; end up. انتهى

(intransitive, idiomatic) To attend; show up.

I had hoped our first meeting would **turn out** better.

Hundreds of people **turned out** to see the parade.

wash out To remove something by washing. نظف

(idiomatic) To wear away by the flow of water; to erode.

That stain will easily **wash out**.

The sandcastle was **washed out** by the tide.

wear out To cause (something) to become damaged, useless, or ineffective through continued use, especially hard, heavy, or careless use. تآكل

You're going to **wear out** that game if you keep playing so rough with it.

He **wears** a pair of tennis shoes **out** every summer.

work out (transitive, with object after out) To calculate. حل , اكتشف
(transitive) To make sense of.

Can you **work out** 250×12 in your head for me? Can you **work out** how to get to the university by car?

I can't **work** these instructions **out**.
