go on with – to continue an activity, especially after a pause or break

That's enough for now – let's **go on** with it tomorrow.

go through with – to do what is necessary to complete a course of action

She decided not to **go through with** the operation.

grow out of – to be become too big to fit into pieces of clothing – to stop doing sth as you become older. He's already **grown out of** his school uniform.

Most children suck their thumbs but they **grow out of** it.

hold on to – to keep sth that is an advantage for you

You should hold on to your oil shares. She took an early lead in the race and held on to it for nine laps.

keep up with - Stay at the same level as someone or something مواكبة

Bill walks so fast it's difficult to **keep** up with him.

live up to – to do as well as or be as good as other people expect you to.

He failed to **live up to** his parents' expectations.

The team called 'The No-Hopers' certainly lived up to its name.

look down on - Consider as inferior

look up to - Admire

He was a wonderful teacher and many students **looked up to** him.
